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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

St. Dominic's College was established in 1965 as an affiliated college of the University of Kerala by the catholic management of St. Dominic's Forane Church, Kanjirappally. Later, with the establishment of the Mahatma Gandhi University in 1983, the college became one of the A grade colleges affiliated to it. The college has been rendering yeoman service to generations of students ever since its inception. At present, the college has 13 undergraduate and 6 postgraduate programs. One of its departments, viz., the Department of Commerce, is a research center whereas the other departments are continuously striving to attain that status. The college provides ample facilities for its students to develop their intellectual, physical, aesthetic, social, emotional, and moral capacities in an integrated manner. The college has instituted numerous scholarships and endowments in view of promoting the aforesaid capacities of the students. Various clubs covering a wide range of activities play a vital role in the campus life of students. Both in the curricular and co-curricular areas, the college maintain a unique position in the Mahatma Gandhi University. Every year UG and PG students of the college secure top positions in various university examinations. In the arena of Sports and Games too, the college wins laurels every year. The extension and community outreach activities of the college were acknowledged with awards. The special initiatives of the college for care to society, sharing of institutional resources and activities for promotion of nationalism are widely appreciated by the public. The phased development of the college is well attested in the accreditation and assessment grades that the college has received earlier, Three Star in 1999, 'B++' in 2007 and 'A' Grade in 2017. The college occupies a place in the 101-150 band of NIRF rankings and was selected for FIST-0 level grant of the Department of Science and Technology (DST) in 2017.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

St. Dominic's College strives to ensure effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and

documented process. Based on the academic calendar of the university, the college prepares its academic calendar, annual action plans and departmental timetables. The academic coordinator makes the daily adjustments in the general timetable and ensures maximum utility of working hours. The daily class management, recording of attendance and continuous assessment process are done through academic management software. The internal and external assessments are conducted as per university norms.

Through induction programmes and bridge courses, Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes were discussed with students. Along with classroom lectures, ICT-enabled tools and methods are adopted and the curriculum learning is supplemented by seminars, workshops, projects, field works, add-on courses, internships, industrial visits, field trips and study tours. The college library with OPAC facility provides services including INFLIBNET- N LIST, DELNET, NDL and e-resources through the college website.

Add on/ certificate courses were offered by all departments. During the last 5 years 3531 students enrolled and completed in 62 different add-on and certificate courses offered by institution or by NPTEL/SWAYAM/MOOC platforms. 568 students completed project works/ internships in the latest completed academic year.

40 courses under various UG and PG programmes include topics on professional ethics in academics, research and business fields, 45 courses address gender issues within their modules. 49 courses deals with environmental issues and 68 courses address issues on human values. Two Agro based B.Voc programmes were started during the assessment period, which helps in providing expert training to the college community on advanced and eco friendly agricultural practices. The Botanical Garden, Herbal Garden, Butterfly Garden, Aquatic Garden, Aquaculture, Apiculture, Fish tanks, Solar panels, Precision farming, Rain water harvesting and Bio-compost units supplements studies on environmental topics while participation in extension activities and best practices instills human values and national commitment.

The institution obtained feedback on the academic performance and ambience of the institution from various stakeholders like students, teachers, parents, employers and alumni. The feedback was analysed, proper actions were taken and action taken report on the feedback is made available on institutional website

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

During the assessment period 2541 students enrolled in the college against 2807 seats amid COVID pandemic. 1327 among the 1546 reserved seats were also filled. The college ensured that 100 percent faculty positions are filled by full time faculty and the teacher student ratio stood at 18.04. Among the student centric teaching learning methods, Experiential Learning includes Internships, Industrial visits, Field visits, Research lab visits, Participation in various national and regional competitions, Projects, Hands-on training, Workshops, Budget analysis etc. Participative learning includes Peer Teaching, Debates & Group Discussions, Book Review & Film Review, Startup ideas & presentation and Problem solving methodologies involves Quizzes and Project works. The teachers of all departments use online tools and ICT for the smooth conduct of classes. The 21 ICT enabled class rooms and Wi-Fi enabled campus supported the blended mode of classes.

The continuous evaluation cell and examination wing conducts internal and external examinations and ensures transparency in the conduct. The College follows the grievance redressal system as directed by the university. A three-tiered grievance procedure has been set up to address student complaints. Complaint boxes are kept in college premises for students to post their complaints and the college website also has provision to submit grievances directly to the principal.

The institution framed the POs, PSOs, and COs for all the programmes offered by the institution and is uploaded on the college website. Teachers are instructed to be familiar with the POs, PSOs, and COs of their courses and are entrusted with communicating them to students. The attainment of course outcomes (COs) and Programme outcomes (POs) are evaluated based on the academic performance of students during an academic year. The overall performance of the college is analyzed using a cutting edge robotic process automation tool and the reports are prepared to evaluate the attainment of outcomes. The institution takes the placement record and higher progression details of the students as evidence of attainment of programme and course outcomes. 2041 among the 2283 students appeared for final year examination passed the respective programmes. The institution conducted student satisfaction surveys and follow-ups were ensured.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college received a research grant of Rs.129.3 lakhs for research purposes from funding agencies. The college had established a thriving ecosystem for research and innovation through the implementation of various initiatives including Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Center, establishing state of the art research infrastructure, collaboration and networking and taking initiatives for creation and dissemination of knowledge by implementing Indian Knowledge System. IEDC is in the forefront of identifying and nurturing budding entrepreneurs within our student community. By providing guidance, support, and resources, we aim to cultivate the entrepreneurial spirit and equip our students with the skills and mindset required for success in the dynamic business world. The college has successfully established a state-of-the-art research lab spanning an impressive area of 6000 square feet, providing an excellent environment for scientific exploration and innovation. We had established a strong collaboration and networking among the various fields in the innovation system, including universities, research institutes, businesses, and government agencies. St. Dominic's College initiated the implementation of the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) in 2022 with a focused mission to promote interdisciplinary research, preserve and disseminate traditional knowledge systems, and foster innovation and collaboration. 43 programmes were conducted related to research / innovation / entrepreneurship during the period. 82 publications were made during the period on reputed research journals and 28 publications were made on books and seminar proceedings.

Extension activities carried out in the neighborhood community had a significant impact on the holistic development of students, as well as the community as a whole. The primary focus of the college was to sensitize students about social issues so that they can become socially responsible citizens with a solid commitment to humanity and nature. The extension activities were carried out under the leadership of NSS. NSS volunteers work in close collaboration with the local community to identify their needs and sustainable solutions. The volunteers also engaged in capacity-building programs to empower the local community to take charge of their development and contribute to the growth of the nation. 205 activities were conducted during the period and 19 awards were received from various agencies.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college infrastructure includes 51 classrooms, 21 ICT enabled classrooms, 3 Seminar Halls, 1 Conference Hall, 3 Smart Classrooms, 2 Multipurpose Auditoriums, Common Science Research Lab supported by DST, 10 Departmental Laboratories, Computer Lab, Language Lab, Life Science Museum and Herbarium. A total of Rs. 774.9 lakhs was spent for infrastructure augmentation and another Rs. 417.56 lakhs was spent for maintenance of physical and academic facilities. The college has 137 computers of which 127 are for academic purposes and the student computer ratio stands at 11.79. The campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled, and all staffrooms

have LAN ports for internet (200 mbps and 21 Wi-Fi access points) which ensures best-in-class network speed without interruptions. A transformer (340KV), a 5 Kw solar plant in the new block and a Generator (120KV) was installed.

The sports infrastructure facilities includes 400mts 8-lane track, Volleyball court, Basketball court with concrete surface, Football court, Handball court, Cricket pitch - Turf Wicket (maintained by Kerala Cricket Association), Long jump pit-2 (One pit with synthetic runway), Ball badminton court, Wrestling facilities, Weight Training set, Table Tennis board, Yoga Corner and Free hostel facilities. The college is Divyangjan friendly with ramps, wheel chair and special toilets. College Canteen and Girls Hostel are located within the campus. A newly constructed Toilet Complex for girls and boys, Women Amenity Center and a special room for lady teachers, water coolers and filters, parking facilities and full time emergency health service are available in the campus. The green campus is maintained through well planted Botanical, Herbal, Butterfly and Aquatic gardens.

The library is fully automated with KOHA, an Integrated Library Management System Open Source Software that provides a user-friendly environment with the best learning experience. Campus wide access to library is provided through Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) via LAN and remote access via Web OPAC Access to e-books and e-journals through paid databases like INFLIBNET, N-LIST and DELNET and DSpace. The library has a total collection of 34623 books and subscribes to 13 academic journals, 50 magazines and 8 newspapers.

Student Support and Progression

The college ensured that student support systems are functioning on full mode to ensure better outputs by students. 5065 students out of total 7012 benefitted with scholarships, free ships, endowments or proficiency prizes instituted by government, non government and management bodies. 3249 students benefitted with capacity development and skills enhancement activities for improving students' capability in the areas of Soft skills, Language and communication skills, Life skills (Yoga, physical fitness, health and hygiene) and ICT/computing skills. 4419 students benefitted with training programmes related to career counseling and competitive examinations. Through the implementation of guidelines of statutory/regulatory bodies, organization wide awareness and undertakings on policies with zero tolerance, mechanisms for submission of online/offline students' grievances and timely redressal of the grievances through appropriate committees the institution ensured redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases. 1123 students among the passed out 2333 students opted for higher studies or got placements in various sectors. 191 students passed various competitive examinations like IIT/JAM/NET/SLET/GATE/GMAT/GPAT/CLAT/CAT/GRE/TOEFL/IELTS/Civil services / State government examinations etc. 271 students won awards or medals at state / national / international levels in sports and cultural events. Students of the college participated in 188 different cultural or sports events at an average of 37.6 events per year.

Former Students Association (FOSA), the college's active alumni association, constituted in 1972 (Reg. No. KTM/TC/284/2022) acts as a bridge between alumni and their alma mater by giving the current and former students a chance to develop positive synergies and grow together. FOSA extends the required support in the endeavors of the college including infrastructural development and provides support in extension and outreach activities of the college. FOSA has generously associated with the college's initiative "Koodeyund SDC" for supporting the needy students and families at the times of COVID pandemic and disastrous floods in 2021. The activities of FOSA during the assessment period includes providing support to alumni gatherings, delivering

expert lectures, motivational talks and industry/work experience sharing and a financial support of Rs 8 lakhs was received from alumni during the period for various purposes.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Institutional governance is carried out through different committees with the Governing Body at the top. The College Council comprising of Heads of Departments, the IQAC Coordinator and the Librarian advise the Principal in the internal affairs of the college. The IQAC ensures that whatever is done in the institution is done efficiently and effectively. The college had constituted various committees of participative nature for the smooth functioning of the college. The Parent-Teacher Association and the Former Students Association form the part of the governance by providing their continuous support in various forms. The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc. Institution implemented e-governance in its operations in administration, finance and accounts, student admission and support and examination. The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression. A committee for mobilization of funds is functioning in the college. The committee studies new schemes of Department of Science and Technology, University Grants Commission, Kerala State Higher Education Council etc and inform the same to the Management or concerned teachers. Funds raised from self financing courses, alumni and well wishers also helped in meeting the financial needs of the college.

56.4 percentage of teaching and non-teaching staff participated in Faculty Development Programmes (FDP), Management Development Programmes (MDPs), professional development /administrative training programs and 108 staff members were provided with financial support to attend conferences/workshops during the last five years.

The IQAC initiates and follows various processes towards achieving academic excellence and ensuring quality enhancement. IQAC took measures to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the teaching, learning and assessment strategies and ensured the attainment of the outcomes. Institutional Development Plan was made and actions were taken to implement the proposals. Quality assurance initiatives of the institution include regular meeting of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) and follow-up action taken, Collaborative quality initiatives with other institutions and Participation in NIRF and other recognized rankings.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Gender equity within the campus is implemented by the provision of comfortable working atmosphere, empowerment strategies, fine tuning of skills and making young men aware of their role in providing an equitable space to women. The campus is gender neutral and the college adopted a unified gender-neutral uniform for students. Women Empowerment Cell organised various awareness raising campaigns on gender equity, legal rights of women, health & hygiene and cyber security. Gender Justice Forum is constituted to create awareness among students about gender equity and protect them from the depravities. An Annual gender report comprising of measures undertaken for gender equity and analysis of gender distribution among various sectors is prepared by the women cell.

The institution has facilities and initiatives for alternate sources of energy and energy conservation measures,

management of the various types of degradable and non degradable waste, water conservation, green campus initiatives and disabled-friendly, barrier free environment. The institutional environment and energy initiatives are confirmed through green audit / environment audit, energy audit, clean and green campus initiatives and beyond the campus environmental promotion activities.

The college fosters mutual respect and fellowship between the staff, students and other stakeholders irrespective of caste, creed and gender. The inclusive nature of the institution is evident throughout its way of functioning, starting from the administrative level to the grass-root level. Activities reminding the students on the need to protect the unity and integrity of the country, safeguard public property, protect and preserve cultural heritage sites, and to preserve the natural environment were organized

Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>We are a multidisciplinary institution having varied departments in Humanities, Science, Commerce and Languages. The college is committed to provide as much flexibility in curriculum for a holistic and value-based multidisciplinary education to all as and when it gets autonomy in designing curriculum. The fifth semester undergraduate students can select a course from a pool of courses irrespective of their program of study. To promote interdisciplinary research in the region and in the institution we in collaboration with JSS Academy Mysore organized a hands-on training on the equipment in the Botany, Chemistry and Physics research laboratories of the college. The Department of Physics of the college organized a</p>
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workshop and a refresher course with the sponsorship of the three prestigious National Science Academies. St. Dominic's College, being affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University is bound to follow the curriculum and syllabus of the university. However the institution adopts and implements the directions taken by university in tune with the changes that take place in the field of education. Within its sphere of freedom, the college tried to develop an interdisciplinary / multidisciplinary academic approach. By providing Add on/Certificate courses in different disciplines and admissions to this courses being open to all students create opportunities to multi disciplinary studies. The college promotes and supports students to enroll in online courses in diverse fields offered by NPTEL / SWAYAM. The institution conducts seminars and workshops of interdisciplinary nature. The construction of Science Research Lab, the most spacious one among affiliated colleges in the region, and installation of equipment funded by DST, accelerates the chances of multi disciplinary research between science departments of the college and ignites collaborative works with other institutions. A multidisciplinary online journal titled Reflection was published by the college that promotes diverse research activities.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credits will be implemented in the college as and when the Government/ University permits. The college is being an affiliated institution, can only follow the instructions of affiliating University in the implementation of Academic Bank of Credits. A nodal officer is appointed to follow the instructions from the university/UGC and to take appropriate measures. Teachers are instructed to give awareness to students on the concept of Academic Bank of Credits. The institution will adopt the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits as and when the institution gets an autonomy status to award degree.

3. Skill development:

The college has two NSQF programs at the undergraduate level. Though the government of India proposes multiple entry and exits options, the University has not incorporated these provisions in the program design. Being an aided institution we require state government decision to implement any system which affects the workload of teachers. Realizing the need of skill based education, St.

	<p>Dominic's College included measures for improving the multi dimensional skills of our students, even though being restricted to follow university curriculum. Through the seminars, assignments, projects and field visits, the soft skills like presentation skills and interview skills, general language skills and writing skills are integrated into the curriculum. Skill training programme and courses in various fields are offered by the Departments, HRD Cell, Women Empowerment Centre, Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Cell (IEDC), Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP). The college conducts special programs for enhancing the Communication and IT Skills through targeted programmes. The artistic and sports programmes and other club and association activities are directed at developing various Life skills and cultural skills along with the co-curricular and extra -curricular ones. Being a local chapter of NPTEL, students are encouraged to follow skill based courses.</p>
<p>4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>The college provides opportunities for community engagement through the activities of NSS and other cells. In addition to curriculum delivery we provide classes and programs to develop humanistic, ethical, constitutional and universal human values of truth (satya), righteous conduct (dharma), peace (shanti), love (prem), nonviolence (ahimsa), scientific temper, citizenship values and also life skills. We also provide value education classes with the help of a textbook authored by our own faculty. To make the education more holistic we provide opportunities to participate in community service/ awareness programs. Courses based on Indian language and culture is offered in Malayalam and Hindi languages and literatures; Malayalam is employed to teach science and social science subjects as part of the multilingual approach of the institution and also in administrative purposes. The Hindi Department, even being a single faculty department conducts various programmes for popularization of Hindi. By Nurturing a herbal Garden, we are providing the pieces of valuable knowledge about Indian medicinal system to students. The institution also takes effort to integrate the Indian tradition and culture through celebrating days of National importance as well as national festivals like Holi along with regional festivals. Special programmes are included under best</p>

	practices to inculcate the sense of Nationalism and Pride among student community.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The College follows the syllabus of affiliated university which not fully outcome based. Yet the college by itself framed outcomes for the programmes and courses offered by us. Under the initiative of IQAC, these Programme Outcomes, Course Outcomes and Programme Specific Outcomes have been incorporated into the teaching-learning process. Students are made aware of outcome based education and attainment of outcomes, through orientations right from the time of admission. The attainment of outcome is monitored through the continuous evaluation committee constituted by the college. The academic software is constructed in a way that the outcomes can be evaluated systematically. Teachers are encouraged to be updated on outcome based approach through participation in various seminars, workshops and induction programmes by HRDC.
6. Distance education/online education:	The college has 13 undergraduate programs of which six are vocational programs. We are looking forward to convert the non-vocational programs to vocational while implementing NEP 2020. At present the students of NSQF programs are sent to various industries or institutions to do their project work. The college encourages all students to do internships. Being a non autonomous institution cannot offer distance education by its own, but the possibilities of online education are utilized. The institution ensured the availability of online facilities and gadgets to all its students, with the support of management, teachers, alumni and well wishers. IQAC organized digital teaching training for teachers to enable them with online resources and platforms. The institution updated its website, Wi-Fi facility, computer labs and upgraded Information Communication Technology. International and National seminars have been organized in the online mode facilitating wide spectrum knowledge exchange. Many faculty members have attended Faculty Development Programmes in the online mode.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The College follows the curriculum under the CBCS system framed by the MG University Kottayam. The college fulfils its role in curriculum design through memberships in Board of studies and participation in curriculum restructuring workshops organised by the University. The syllabus of add on courses offered by the institution are framed by the concerned departments. Environment and Human Rights is a compulsory topic at the UG level and cross-cutting issues prescribed in syllabus like gender equity, environmental issues and professional ethics illustrated with due importance. Open courses are offered in the fifth semester and a choice based course in the sixth semester of all under graduate programmes. Each student is supported by a teacher as a guide for doing the project work prescribed in the curriculum.

Based on the academic calendar of the university, the college prepares its academic calendar, annual action plans and departmental timetables. The academic coordinator makes the daily adjustments in the general timetable, in cases of leave by teachers and ensures maximum utility of working hours. The daily class management, recording of attendance and continuous assessment process are done through academic management software. The continuous evaluation Cell monitors the effective conduct of internal assessment through centralized mid semester and model examinations and regular class tests are conducted at department level. The marks uploaded to the shared drive in college domain are accessible to all teachers, by which slow learners are identified and supported with remedial classes and peer support. The academic performance of students is discussed with parents through PTA meetings. The college has an examination wing for conducting external examinations as per university exam calendar.

An induction programme is conducted for first year students, followed by a bridge course at department level. The Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes are discussed with students at the beginning of each semester. Along with classroom lectures, ICT-enabled tool and methods are adopted to ensure an audio-visual learning experience especially to the socially and economically disadvantaged students. The teachers use online LMS platforms and other social platforms for curricular delivery. The curriculum learning is supplemented by seminars and workshops, project and field works, add-on courses, internships, industrial visits, field trips and study tours. The college library with OPAC facility provides services including INFLIBNET- N LIST, DELNET, NDL and e-resources through the college website.

The college ensures student participation in Additional Skill Acquisition Programme, Walk-with-Scholar and Scholar-Support-Programme, add-on and certificate courses offered by NPTEL/SWAYAM/MOOC to enhance intellectual competency of the students, along with counseling support for stress management. The college constitutes various committees to deal with each of the above initiatives ensuring attainment

of specified targets. Physical Education Department of the college strives to instill health awareness and leadership qualities.

Feedback on curriculum from various stakeholders, Teacher Evaluation survey and academic audits conducted annually under the supervision of IQAC serves as basis for review of adopted strategies.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

The college addresses interdisciplinary social and ecological issues by implementing a range of extracurricular activities such as value education classes, personality enhancement trainings, day observances, campaigns, workshops, camps, and debates to supplement these topics in the curriculum. Open courses on relevant issues are being offered by the college.

As a first step in fostering a culture of professional ethics, the institution adopted the UGC Code of Conduct on campus, which is made available to all stakeholders via the college website. 40 courses under various UG and PG programmes include topics on professional ethics in academic, research and business fields. The college conducted FDP programmes and workshops/seminars on research methodology, research ethics and academic writings. Additional Training programmes on professional and Business ethics are provided to the students.

45 courses under various UG and PG programmes address gender issues within their modules. Two courses, *Women's Writing* for BA English and *Gender in Indian Perspective* for BA History is exclusively on gender related topics. The curriculum transaction is supported by Gender Justice Forum, Health Club and women empowerment cell through awareness programmes on gender equity, health and hygiene, menstrual safety and hygiene, webinars on Legal Rights and Cyber Security, Self defence training and Women's day celebrations.

A well maintained and green campus is the first initiative on instilling a positive thinking on environmental issues. One course on environment and a MOOC Course on Organic Farming is made

compulsory for all Undergraduate students and 49 courses under various UG and PG programmes deals with environmental issues within their course of study. Two Agro based B.Voc programmes were started during the assessment period, which helps in providing expert training to the college community on advanced and eco friendly agricultural practices. The Botanical Garden, Herbal Garden, Butterfly Garden, Aquatic Garden, Aquaculture, Apiculture, Fish tanks, Solar panels, Precision farming, Rain water harvesting and Bio-compost compost units supplements studies on environmental topics and instils an eco sensitive mind set among students. The College planted trees for a Miyawaki forest in association with Forest Department of Kerala and created awareness on Social Forestry among students. A series of talks by experts on environmental issues is uploaded in the official YouTube channel of the college for the public. Students take lead roles the Green initiatives by NSS, Bhoomithrasena and Forestry club which includes quiz programs on environment, nature camps, nature tours, observance of forest day, environment day and awareness programs against degradation of nature. Awareness classes are given to ladies in the campus on use of environment friendly menstrual cups.

68 Courses under various UG and PG Programmes address issues on human values and helps in imparting the feelings like sympathy, empathy, patience and cultural values. Value education classes are conducted within the academic schedule of the college. Workshops and seminars on life skills, extension activities and best practices, Honesty shop, programs for differently abled and observance of important days are all multifaceted programs to instil human values. Canteen maintenance and table etiquette are transferred through canteen usage policies.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The College follows the guidelines of MG University in conducting internal and external assessment for UG and PG Programmes. The guidelines are published in the handbook circulated among students. The assessment process is being familiarized at the beginning of the programme. The continuous evaluation Cell ensures that the assessment process is done in a time bound and transparent manner. The college uses its academic management software for recording internal assessment process. The software is designed so that the class teachers can access data of all courses in a class, the Head of Department can access data of all students in the programmes of the department and the principal can access the data of all programmes offered by the college.

The internal assessment is based on the components; attendance, Assignment/Seminar/Viva and Test papers. The attendance is directly entered into the portal by the course in charges from the class itself and the data is accessible to students. Any grievances related to attendance are dealt under the rules and regulations of the university. The course in charge assigns various assignments/seminars or conduct viva voce to all the students and the topics are informed to the entire class for transparency.

The continuous evaluation cell conducts centralized mid semester and model examinations, while regular class tests are conducted at department level. The internal exam committee declares exam notifications and exam timetable in advance to facilitate better preparations by students. Instructions against

malpractices are given to all students by invigilators and CCTV cameras are set in all the exam rooms. The committee ensures time bound declaration of results and makes necessary arrangements for uploading of marks by course in charges. The marks uploaded to the shared drive in college domain are accessible to all teachers. The final grade sheet prepared by the software is published for verification by students, which will be signed by the students after redressal of grievances if any. The grade sheet is verified by the Head of Department and Principal before uploading to the University.

The external evaluation is done directly by the university and the Examination wing of the college ensures transparent and time bound conduct of external examinations. The studies by an external agency based on data from university found that our college ranks in the top in terms of consistency between internal and external marks.

The College follows the grievance redressal system as directed by the university. A three-tiered grievance procedure has been set up to address student complaints: at the departmental level, the first level is handled by the course coordinator and the head of the department; at the college level, the second level is handled by a committee of the principal, head of the department, and a senior teacher; and at the university level, the third level is handled by a committee appointed by the vice chancellor.

Complaint boxes are kept in college premises for students to post their complaints and the College website also has provision to submit grievances directly to the principal.

St. Dominic's College, being an affiliated college follows the syllabus prescribed by Mahatma Gandhi University. The present University syllabus was not made in an outcome based approach. The institution framed the POs, PSOs, and COs for all the programmes offered by the institution and is uploaded on the college website. Teachers are instructed to be familiar with the POs, PSOs, and COs of their courses and are entrusted with communicating them to students. The IQAC encourages the faculty to participate in seminars, FDPs, and workshops related to outcome based education as well as in syllabus revision workshops conducted by the university. Orientation Programmes aimed at communicating the details of POs, PSOs, and COs to students are organized at college and department levels prior to the start of each programme. Class teachers periodically discuss the programme outcomes to keep students being informed of the scope and extent of each programme, the future opportunities and make sure that all the

students have a clear idea about the POs, PSOs, and COs of their programmes. During class hours the faculty in charge of a particular course explains the COs in detail. The fulfillment of the objectives of the programme is measured through internal and external evaluations and through a result analysis software prepared by Statistics department.

Response:

The attainment of course outcomes (COs) and Programme outcomes (POs) are evaluated based on the academic performance of students during an academic year. Student evaluation process has been categorized into Internal and External evaluation with a weightage allotted in the ratio 1:4. A set of performance evaluation criteria is used for continuous and quantitative assessment of outcomes. They are internal and external examinations, test papers, assignments, seminar presentation, practical, internships, specimen collections, projects and viva voce.

The UG programmes have indirect grading system and the PG programmes have direct grading for assessment. The UG programmes are evaluated in a seven point scale (Outstanding (S), Excellent (A+) Very Good (A), Good (B+) Above Average (B), Satisfactory (C), Pass (D) and Failure (F)). The evaluation of PG courses are done in a five point scale and that of overall grading is done in a seven point scale (Outstanding (A+), Excellent (A) Very Good (B+), Good (B) fair (C+), Satisfactory (C), Marginal (D) and Deficient (F))

The question papers for internal assessment examinations are prepared in such way to assess the level of attainment of specified outcomes. Questions with varied difficulty levels are included in the question papers. In the model examinations 55% of the questions are aimed at evaluating student's understanding level of the course topics and the rest 45% of the questions help in evaluating the application level and analysis capability of the students. External Examinations are conducted using question papers generated from the question bank prepared by university as per the guidelines of Outcome Based Education.

Relevant topics related to the course outcomes are given as assignments/seminars. Understanding of the topic, analytic ability, formulation of ideas, use of arguments, use of resources, style of presentation and clarity are the criteria used for the evaluation of assignments. Seminar presentations are evaluated on the basis of the content, style of presentation and defense to questions. Evaluation parameters of student projects include punctuality, experimentation, content and presentation. Laboratory works, Internships and Specimen collections also help to attain the course and programme outcomes.

The overall performance of the college is analyzed using a cutting edge robotic process automation tool and the reports are prepared to evaluate the attainment of outcomes. Based on the analysis, the plan of action for enhancement in level of attainment of outcomes is made and implemented. The institution takes the placement record and higher progression details of the students as evidence of attainment of programme and course outcomes.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1

The Institution has adequate infrastructure and other facilities for,

- **teaching – learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc**

Facilities for Cultural and sports activities, yoga centre, games (indoor and outdoor), Gymnasium, auditorium etc (Describe the adequacy of facilities in maximum of 500 words.)

Response:

The college is situated in a lush green campus of about 25 acres and has a strategic location near NH 183 which affords an easy access to all the amenities. The Old Block consists of all the important offices of administration, Career and Placement Cell, Science Labs, Language Lab, 3 Seminar Halls, Visitors Parlour, Guest Room, Smart Classroom, Library, Honesty Shop, Counseling and Medical Aid room, Chapel and classrooms of all the aided programmes. The New Block houses Computer Lab, RUSA Funded Science Research Lab, Conference Hall and classrooms of all the self-financing programmes.

21 ICT enabled classrooms and seminar halls are equipped with Wi-Fi/LAN facilities and LCD/Smart boards. Classrooms are provided with green boards, lecterns, adequate furniture and public address system. College has 3 Seminar Halls, 1 Conference Hall, 1 Smart Classroom, and 2 Multipurpose Auditoriums for the practice of various games and cultural activities. All departments have separate faculty rooms and the departments are provided with IT supports. The entire campus and all the examination halls are under CCTV surveillance.

The college has a Common Science Research Lab supported by DST, 10 departmental laboratories (Botany - 2, Zoology – 1, Chemistry - 3, Physics - 2, 1 Food Processing Laboratory and 1 Food Analysis Laboratory), Language Lab, Life Science Museum and Herbarium with various specimens.

The college has 137 computers distributed in various computer labs, college offices, departments, labs, classrooms and library. The college has adequate number of printers and reprographic machines, server for the smooth functioning of library software and a public address system. The campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled, and all staffrooms have LAN ports for internet (200 mbps and 21 Wi-Fi access points) which ensures best-in-class network speed without interruptions. A transformer (340KV), a solar plant in the New Block and a Generator (120KV) is installed for uninterrupted power supply.

The college is an exemplary example in protecting the environment with Butterfly Garden, Herbal Garden, Pteridophyte Garden etc. and familiarizing various agricultural practices like Precision Farming, Rainwater Harvesting, Portable Vermicomposting, Rain Shelter etc.

The college stands pre-eminent with its grand track records in sports and possesses infrastructural facilities like 400mts 8-lane track, Volleyball court, Basketball court with concrete surface, Football

court, Handball court, Cricket pitch- Turf Wicket (maintained by Kerala Cricket Association), Long jump pit-2 (One pit with synthetic runway), Ball badminton court, , Wrestling facilities, Weight Training set, Table Tennis board, Yoga Corner and Free hostel facilities. The college functions as an Academy of Kerala State Sports Council in Athletics.

The college is Divyangjan friendly with ramp, wheel chair and special toilets. Canteen facility with Open kitchen and a Girls Hostel are located within the campus. Fuel saving devices like Steam based cooking, Oil Turbo etc. are in use. A newly constructed Toilet Complex for girls and boys, Women Amenity Center and a special room for lady teachers, Water Coolers and Filters, Parking facilities and full time emergency health service are available in the campus.

The library is fully automated with KOHA, an Integrated Library Management System Open Source Software that provides a user-friendly environment with the best learning experience. The total area of the college library is 696 sq.m. with the latest extension of 214 sq.m using RUSA funds and it has a seating capacity for 114 users. The library is open to staff and students from 8.30 am to 4.30 pm on all working days. The library has separate reading facilities for both faculty and students. The library facilities include ample reading space, property counter, OPAC, and Digi world. Library Advisory Committee meets periodically and assures the systematic functioning of the library.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

Response:

The college recognizes the importance of ICT facilities for academic purposes and the IT infrastructural facilities are steadily improved to equip students to be skilled in a techno-imperative society. The college has 137 computing systems distributed in five computer labs, departments, laboratories, classrooms, and library. The institution possesses a High-Speed Wi-Fi facility which ensures best-in-class network speed without interruptions. The college has BSNL VPN connection with 200 mbps speed and Kerala Vision connection with 100 Mbps. The routers are future-ready with 5 GHz Wi-Fi capability in addition to the regular 2.4GHz, so that the upgradation to the next-level of Wi-Fi will be smooth. The campus is fully WiFi enabled with 21 access points and uninterrupted network is made available to all staff and students. All computers and networking systems are secured by regular updation of software and anti virus installment.

The college has enhanced technology enabled learning spaces with 21 ICT-enabled classrooms, Seminar halls and Conference rooms that are equipped with Wi-Fi/LAN facilities and Digital Panel boards/Smart Boards. The college has a public address system and a server for the smooth functioning of library

software. The Language Lab offers a technologically enriched language learning platform and the institution functions as a local chapter of Swayam,NPTEL. The G-suite subscription facilitates college e-mail addresses with institutional domain, unlimited drive storage, administrative tools, advanced settings, Google classroom, meet, etc. The college has a reprographic machine and uninterrupted power supply with 340KV transformer, a solar plant and a 120 KV Generator.

The college website serves as a virtual gateway for students, faculty and visitors to access information, resources, and services provided by the institution. Webpage updation is decentralized with the participation of departments and various clubs. Educational e-content generation and transmission are done through college website and online platforms. Enterprise Resource Planning of the college is provided by IPSR solutions which digitalizes the academic and administrative activities of the college: admission, internal mark, attendance, examination etc. Teacher evaluation and exam management are done online and service matters of the staff are done through SPARK software.

The college library is fully automated with KOHA, an Integrated Library Management System which is updated regularly and D Space Repository for managing digital collections. It also provides campus-wide access to library OPAC via LAN and remote access via Web OPAC. The college library subscribes to proprietary and open-source electronic resources such as databases, e-journals, e-books, electronic theses and dissertations. N-LIST and DELNET subscriptions are renewed every year.

Departments provide training for C++ program, Origin Lab, Gnu Plot, R- Program, Rasmol (protein visualization software), UPSTOX, Money control and conducts add-on courses in Typesetting in LaTeX, R- Programming, data analysis using SPSS and Gretl software, Digital Marketing, SPSS essentials, and MS office. Hands-on training is given regularly to the staff on software and advanced educational technologies. Needy students are provided with electronic gadgets to ensure their participation in online learning. The expenditure to meet the advancement of IT facilities is earnestly supported by the management, teachers, philanthropists and alumni.

There is a registered Alumni Association that contributes significantly to the development of the institution through financial and/or other support services

Response:

Former Students Association (FOSA), the college's active alumni association, constituted in 1972 (Reg. No. KTM/TC/284/2022) acts as a bridge between alumni and their alma mater, giving the current and former students a chance to develop positive synergies and grow together.

The office bearers except the teacher in charge and the treasurer are elected by its members once in three years. The outgoing students of every year turn out to be members of FOSA, with a onetime membership fee of Rs.100. The presence of 12 alumni in the present faculty is a boost to the activities of FOSA. Besides FOSA, departments have their own alumni forums through which the alumni motivate and extend their expertise to the present students. FOSA promotes department/batch wise gatherings all around the year. Several batches of various departments had reunions during the last 5 years.

FOSA extends the required support in the endeavours of the college including infrastructural development and provides support in extension and outreach activities of the college. FOSA has generously associated with the college's initiative "Koodeyund SDC" for supporting the needy students and families at the times of COVID pandemic and disastrous floods in 2021.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

Response:

Institutional governance is carried out through different committees with the Governing Body at the top. The Governing Body of the college consists of eleven members, out of which two are staff representatives. The next two important committees are the College Council and the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The College Council comprising of Heads of Departments, the IQAC Coordinator and the Librarian advise the Principal in the internal affairs of the college. The IQAC ensures that whatever is done in the institution it is done efficiently and effectively.

The Planning Committee make suggestions regarding introduction of new infrastructure facilities and programs. Research Management and Monitoring Cell keeps track of promoting research in the institution. Student Grievance Redressal Committee, Anti-ragging Committee, Anti-harassment Committee, Internal Complaints Committee, Gender Justice Forum, Equal Opportunity Cell, SC/ST Monitoring Cell, Discipline Committee, Ethics Committee and Right to Information ensure the prevalence of a healthy environment in the campus.

The Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) and the Former Students Association (FOSA) form the part of the governance by providing their continuous support in various forms. The PTA provides the required stationery materials to the students at subsidized rates through its 'Honesty Shop'. It is meant to cultivate virtues like honesty, responsibility and integrity in students. PTA gives scholarships and cash awards to students who excel in academic, sports and extracurricular activities. PTA also provides counseling service to the needy students. The FOSA extends financial support and guidance for career development of the students.

The college always tries to provide high quality education to economically and socially disadvantaged students and thereby transforming our nation sustainably into an equitable knowledge society. The management is very keen in improving and maintaining infrastructural facilities through its own funds and government projects-Rashtriya Uchchar Shiksha Abhiyan and DST assistance for setting up of Science Research Laboratories.

The institution tries to train the students in clarity of thought and accuracy of expression. The regular curriculum delivery along with the support programs, namely, Walk With a Scholar, Scholar Support Program, Additional Skill Acquisition Programme, Virtual & Distance Learning (SWAYAM), Massive Open Online Courses, Add on Courses, Certificate Courses make students intellectually competent and ensure their creative involvement in building up a new India.

The institution tries to instill in the students a sense of responsibility to the nation. The activities of

National Service Scheme (NSS), KARUTHAL (Road Safety & Student Welfare), Value Education Cell, Anti-narcotic Club, Charity Club, Bhoomithrasena Club, Population Education Club, Women's Empowerment Cell, Blood Donors' Forum, Honesty Shop, Unnath Baharath Abhiyan and Green, Energy and Environment Auditing Cell help to build up a student community that is morally upright and sensitive to the needs of fellow human beings.

The participation of students in sports, games and other competitions make them leaders. The activities of forums such as College Union, Department Associations, Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Center, Human Resource Development Cell, Debate & Quiz Club, Civil Service Aspiring Students Club, Career Guidance and Placement Cell help the students to develop leadership qualities.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

The overall pass percentage and a number of top positions in the University Examinations are the results of efficient administrative system prevailing in the college. The achievements of our students in sports are due to the policy of the college regarding the use of its facilities for the benefit of students and also for the betterment of sports in the country.

The college takes all efforts to fill vacancies without any delay from the part of the Management. St Dominic's College, Kanjirapally is one among a few colleges in the state having a Principal appointed as per UGC Regulations 2018. To promote research in the institution, candidates having Ph.D. and research aptitude were selected as faculty in the last recruitment. A non-teaching staff member acquired doctoral degree in Botany while he serves as Laboratory Assistant. On realizing the importance of computers in the office administration, the Management appointed computer experts as office attendants during the last recruitment. It has a very efficient and highly qualified office staff so that all appointments and promotions of staff realize in time. The college follows procedure suggested by UGC/ government/ University in all of its appointments and promotions of teachers. It also follows the service rules in the promotions and other service matters of the staff.

The Management ensures timely service to all those who approaches the office. It is ensured that all purchases are in accordance with government directions. All necessary documents are properly prepared and kept in the office for further reference. It is seen from the audit reports that no dues to be paid to the

University or Government.

The attendance and internal marks of students are effectively managed through online mode. Automated library provides ample opportunities for its users. The ICT facilities and laboratories with sophisticated instruments are visible examples of the commitment of the Management in providing tools for effective teaching. In response to the encouragement of the management to attend seminars or faculty development programs, several teachers participated in such programs.

It is the policy of the Management to share our facilities with the public. For example, the sports facilities were provided to candidates who cleared written test of Kerala Public Service Commission for police recruitment. As a result of the training given by the physical education department of the college, several candidates got selection to police service and armed forces.

Perhaps it is the only college in the state having gender neutral uniform dress for the students. The hostel toilet and canteen facilities are remarkable in terms of hygiene. The concepts of open kitchen and self service in the canteen are implemented as part of the policy of the management.

Clean and green campus, solar energy utilization, rain water harvesting and distribution of water to the public, water garden, butter fly garden, medicinal plants garden, bee-keeping, poly-house cultivation are visible examples of environment friendly policies of the institution.

As a result of the activities of different committees no case of ragging, harassment, narcotics reported from the campus.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The promotion of teachers is based on the performance based appraisal system as specified by UGC. It takes into account the following aspects: teaching and learning related activities, involvement in the co-curricular and extracurricular activities and research. All the aforesaid aspects of the teacher to be promoted is verified by a screening committee consisting of two external experts nominated by the University. On the recommendation of the screening committee, the Manager considers the request for promotion of the teacher and give promotion order if the Manager is satisfied with the performance of the incumbent. For promotion of non-teaching staff they have to clear various departmental tests- Manual of Office Procedures, Account Test (Lower and Higher)- conducted by Kerala Public Service Commission. The members of non-teaching staff who are eligible for promotion are promoted on the basis of seniority and their performance. The Principal can record specific comments regarding the performance of each staff member in his/ her service book. The Manager also continuously assesses the performance of each one and sanctions/ rejects annual increment accordingly. The Management organizes training programme/ orientation talks for teachers and non-teaching staff.

The evaluation of performance of teachers and non-teaching staff by the students is done by circulating questionnaires. The report of the evaluation is prepared and handed over to each staff member.

Each Department has its own well furnished staff room with toilet facilities. In addition lady teachers have a common comfort room. Hostel facility is available for lady teachers. An air conditioned guest room is available free of cost for teachers who stay in the college as part of any kind of duty.

The Management extends financial support to the newly appointed staff members till they receive salary from the Government. The Management provides Travel Allowance to staff members to increase their

competency by attending training programmes/seminars/workshops.

A co-operative society of staff members is functioning in the campus. Major functions of the society include granting of loans, accepting deposits and conducting group deposit and credit scheme.

Staff Association works as a forum to discuss common problems of the faculty and communicate the same with the Management. It conducts meetings to felicitate retiring staff members, felicitate its members for the personal achievement and pay homage to the deceased. It also organizes tour programmes and arranges gatherings to celebrate Onam and Christmas.

Retired Staff Association is a forum of retired teaching and non-teaching staff to maintain the relationship of persons who have worked for a long period in the institution. It provides opportunity of meeting twice a year for the maintenance of relationship with the institution.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

A committee for mobilization of funds is functioning in the college. The committee studies new schemes of Department of Science and Technology, University Grants Commission, Kerala State Higher Education Council etc and inform the same to the Management or concerned teachers. The college has been conducting programs using funds sanctioned by various governmental/non-governmental agencies.

The maintenance of equipments in research laboratory is done using the consultation fee received from industries for testing their samples. The B.Voc. Agro Food Technology students raise funds for their activities by selling their products during the food fests organized by them.

The playground is maintained by giving it to other institutions having no facilities for sports by charging nominal user fee. The college conducts training camps during holidays by collecting a fixed charge. An MoU has been signed with the district cricket association for construction and maintenance of cricket pitch.

The Departments/clubs usually conduct programs/competitions with the financial support of local sponsors or collaborators.

We receive voluntary donations from financially sound parents of the students at the time of admission.

As we get fire wood free of cost from the rubber estate of the Management, steam based cooking system is installed at the kitchen of the college hostel. The cooked food items in the canteen is also preparing in the hostel kitchen. As a result we are able to provide food items at low rates. As we follow self service

system in the canteen there is no waste of food.

The college is a center of public service commission examinations which are conducted during holidays and gets a certain amount of money for the same.

5 KW solar panel is installed to reduce electricity bill. The overflow water from the water tank is used for fish farming. The excreta of fish are used as manure for vegetable cultivation. The dry leaves and biodegradable waste collected as part of daily campus cleaning are converted into vermin compost which is used as manure for farming by B.Voc. Agricultural Technology students.

There is internal audit for Parent Teacher Association accounts and Former Students Association accounts every year. There is annual government audit for statutory accounts and external audit for St Dominic's College Trust accounts. The annual external audit of St Dominic's College Trust accounts is done by Jose Kappen & Co., Chartered Accountants, Thodupuzha-685584.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC plays the leading role in implementing quality initiatives in the college. It initiates and follows various processes towards achieving academic excellence and ensuring quality enhancement. IQAC took measures to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the teaching, learning, and assessment strategies and ensures the attainment of the outcomes. Institutional Development Plan was made and actions were taken to implement the proposals.

In curricular aspects, the IQAC ensured a smooth shift to online education during pandemic period. Teachers were given training in the use of ICT tools for online teaching. The number of add-on courses offered and the number of students completing add on courses had increased. The feedback mechanism had been strengthened. Efforts were made to introduce diverse methodologies for ICT enabled teaching-learning process. Increased number of Extension and innovative activities were conducted. These processes result in higher pass percentage, progression rates, and placements. Seminars and workshops were conducted in collaboration with departments on leading and diverse topics to ensure academic continuity. Teachers were made familiar with the NAAC accreditation process, including the criteria-based questions and their documentation. Seminars on Reference management Software, Public Financial Management System, National Education Policy, Women Empowerment, Gender Equity,

Cyber Ethics and Security, Digital Apps for Teaching etc were also organized during the period.

IQAC introduced outcome-based education in accordance with the NAAC and UGC manuals. Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes are designed by departments and uploaded in the College Website. Assessment of attainment of outcomes is ensured by evaluation methods. Faculty members are also encouraged to participate in workshops, short-term courses, and syllabus revision. Add-on courses were designed and offered by all departments. Certificate courses on communication skills and ICT are offered and are provided to all students.

The policy of appointing more PhD holders as faculty had increased the research activities and three departments are in the final stages of becoming research departments. More faculty members joined for research and 5 faculty members are serving as research guides.

IQAC played a major role in applying for research grant from DST, infrastructural grant from RUSA, B.Voc programmes and the new generation programme, BFM. A Science Research Lab was constructed and collaborative activities were initiated with various institutions. Construction of Multipurpose Students Amenity Centre, ICT enabled classrooms, seminar halls and Toilet Complex and Extension of library complex helped to address the needs of students.

The introduction of local chapter of NPTEL, Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Cell of Kerala Startup Mission and the Training centre under the PMKVY Skill Initiative are some of the milestones achieved during this phase. MoU's were signed with more than 20 institutions and are functional during the period.

Feedback, satisfaction surveys, and appraisal mechanisms are institutionalized. Academic and Green Audits were conducted. Participation in extension activities and in sports and cultural activities are encouraged. Two best practices KARUTHAL and NATIONAL INTEGRATION THROUGH SOCIAL PARTICIPATION were introduced and are institutionalized, in tune with the distinctive vision of the college.

Response:

The Gender policy of the institution focuses on the creation of an equitable and inclusive environment among all stakeholders. Gender equity within the campus is implemented by the provision of comfortable working atmosphere, empowerment strategies, fine tuning of skills and making young men aware of their role in providing an equitable space to women.

The campus is gender neutral as there is no gender restriction in the campus except at ladies hostel, ladies staff room and students amenity centre. The hostel facility for ladies within campus helps them to enjoy the benefits of education in par with that of gents. The ladies staff room and student amenity centre enable the ladies to lessen their discomforts due to biological reasons and enjoy normal life in the campus. The college adopted a unified gender-neutral uniform on campus effective from 2021, which proved to be a successful step in boosting girl students' confidence and gender parity. A safe and welcoming environment on campus is made possible to all by the installation of CCTV in various locations and the round-the-clock security guard in the campus.

Women Empowerment Cell, the umbrella organisation dealing with women related issues, organised various awareness raising campaigns on gender equity, legal rights of women, Health & Hygiene and cyber security. Skill enhancement programmes like driving, cycling, stitching, IT orientations and Self-Defence training are also provided to both college students and women outside the college. Empowerment initiatives are not limited to the students, but to mothers, widows and singles in the society through orientations on topics like Life style diseases, Food Habits and Organic Farming. LABELLA, the annual women's day celebration of the college is organised to encourage and support lady students, mothers, teachers and small-scale women entrepreneurs in and around the locality.

Gender Justice Forum is constituted to create awareness among students about gender equity and protect them from the depravities such as violence against women, cyber threats and dowry. At the time of admission students are required to sign anti-dowry declaration. The regular services by a women counsellor make girl students more comfortable to disclose their tensions and thoughts.

The procedure for conducting gender audit is being employed in our college. An annual gender report comprising of measures undertaken for gender equity and analysis of gender distribution among various parameters is prepared by the women cell.

The College fosters mutual respect and fellowship between the staff, students and other stakeholders irrespective of caste, creed and gender. The inclusive nature of the institution is evident throughout its way of functioning, starting from the administrative level to the grass-root level. The college governing body is composed of academicians, advocates, industrialists, planters, engineers and elected representatives from faculty.

The clubs and forums of the college ensure equal opportunities of participation to its students. Common celebrations observing religious festivals and competitions as part of important days are often hosted to promote communal harmony. The college celebrated ethnic day acknowledging the unity in diversity of India. As part of outreach programmes, students teach English in the tribal schools. In cooperation with the Tiger Reserve Project, the college arranged an interactive session with the tribal people about the need to combine indigenous and modern agricultural practices. The college organized bio farming class to spread awareness to the farmers. Students and staff are prepared to lead an eco friendly life as part of its green policy.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Response:

St. Dominic's College, Kanirappally is distinctive in its priority and thrust area by assisting the underprivileged communities and small scale industries in its vicinity in aspiring to achieve their professional ambitions and enhance their living standards. Nestled in an agrarian belt, the local community places high expectations on the institution with hopes of securing a sound future to its younger generation and the institution responsibly strives hard to mould its learners into refined individuals, quality leaders and morally upright competent professionals. The myriad programmes of study offered by the college which consists of traditional as well as new generation courses aim to meet the aforesaid demands of the institution's beneficiaries. Vocational courses introduced recently in the curriculum, namely Agriculture Technology and Agro Food Processing mean to be of assistance to native farmers and aspirants in tackling their concerns regarding traditional agricultural practises,

technological advancements and potential entrepreneurial ventures. New generation courses like Bachelor of Financial Markets (BFM) which was added to the curriculum in 2021, intend to equip the students with financial and employability skills to adapt to the requirements of the ever evolving corporate world by exposing and familiarising them with real-time stock market data and responses.

The college infrastructure is open to any initiative that is ultimately beneficial to the welfare of the public. The institution gives ample significance and support to participation and training in sports and games, be it to its students or aspirants from the surrounding community. The college playground with a 400 meters track is the largest of its kind in the region and is properly utilized for sports and games. The cricket pitch is maintained by the Kerala Cricket Association. The college offers fitness training for job seekers in police and armed force services since 2012 and in the year 2022, out of 160 trainees, 112 qualified their physical fitness test and 47 of them successfully joined various armed forces, adding on to the accolades of the college's Physical Education department. The college also provides its playground and associated facilities free of cost to nearby schools every year for the conduct of various sports competitions.

The college staff and students nurture a serene yet lively atmosphere in the campus and ensure the best possible delivery and application of the curriculum. The campus is free of strikes, drugs, ragging and harassments of any form. The college makes the academic atmosphere inclusive to all students coming from different walks of the society and makes sure that none is left behind. The teachers maintain a good rapport with students and mentor them on to a successful life. On a regular working day, the campus teems with life as students move around the whole place in flocks on their way to classes, library, canteen, auditorium or conference halls for academic and extra-curricular activities.

The college introduced gender neutral uniform as a progressive step which aims to eliminate gender biases and barriers and thereby instilling a sense of equality among students. The students are free to wear colour dress on all Wednesdays. It is the first higher educational institution in Kerala to implement gender neutral uniform for its students.

The college is always in the forefront to come up with innovative ideas that augment the academic milieu of the region. The faculty and students extend support to nearby schools in teaching English language. National integration programs organised by the college are open to the public and ensure participation of school children in our vicinity through exhibitions and media. The students and researchers in our locale are prompted to make good use of the college library and lab facilities.

The DST research lab with sophisticated instruments offers unique opportunities for the researchers in Chemistry, Botany and Physics. The facilities also support the farmers and local entrepreneurs in their novel ventures. As part of our resource sharing programs, we organized a national level workshop on chromatography, spectroscopy and microscopy which offered hands on sessions for young researchers all over the country to get acquainted with the modern equipments and to avail the best use of them.

Our college is proactive to the needs of the environment and society we live in. The college produces major portion of its electricity by installing solar panels. It ensures zero waste of food in the canteen and hostel by following self service system. The college maintains a butterfly garden, botanical garden, herbal garden, lotus garden etc for sustainable development. The playground is a major source of rain water harvesting. The college has donated the land for setting up of public pump house for the distribution of drinking water in the nearby places. The college conducts various outreach activities related to environmental protection, health and hygiene, organic farming etc.

Our institution is always sensitive to the exigencies of unprivileged communities. In association with the charitable organization Helpage India, the charity club and National Service Scheme of the college distributed two trucks of essential commodities to thousands of flood affected people in nearby Panchayats. During COVID -19 pandemic, the Parent Teacher Association and the former staff association of the college provided the required support to the needy families of our students. The college also serves as a blood bank of the region.

We are privileged to be ranked in the bandwidth of 101-150 in the latest NIRF ranking. It is really a great honour for us especially in the wake of the fact that we belong to a rural background with more than one-third of our students belonging to BPL families. Notwithstanding the geographical and social constraints, the college is devoted to rearing individuals who could play a decisive role in inculcating and perpetuating socially desirable qualities and skills.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

The college had made remarkable developments in academics, research and infrastructure during the last five years. The total floor area was almost doubled during these years with the construction of a new academic block, ladies hostel, modern canteen, library extension and toilet complex. The College has raised nearly 10 crore rupees from DST, RUSA, NSQF and management funds which accelerated the developments within the college. The Governing Body, Former Students' Association and Parent Teacher Association are active in promoting the academic and administrative aspects of the college. The institution gets pro-active support from the management in expanding ICT and other infrastructural facilities. It has digitally enabled management system for managing attendance, continuous evaluation, result analysis and feedback of students.

The vision of the institution is driven by value-based ethical behaviour of its committed faculty members, staff and students. The institution always thrives for imbibing core value and ethical behaviour into the daily interactions of stakeholders. The college inculcates hygienic and environment friendly culture among the students through awareness and practices. The college provides skill enhancement trainings and placement opportunities. The various clubs and cells create a vibrant campus life to the students. Gender neutral uniform is introduced to convey the message of gender equity among the students.

The phased development of the college is well attested in the accreditation grades that the college has received earlier, Three star in 1999, B++ in 2007 and A Grade in 2017. It has a position in 101-150 rank band of NIRF, perhaps the only college in the list from a rural area.
